Course Description: The field portion of Geo773: Field Studies (Italy/Austria) will take place from September 15 to 23, 2017. It is designed to expose students to a range of issues particular to the destination countries and regions. Geo773: Field Studies is a professional elective course offered to students in the 3rd and 4th year of the Geographic Analysis Program.

Students are responsible for ensuring that they possess the necessary documentation for admission to Italy and Austria - (i.e., Passport, visa if necessary). Space is at a premium, so baggage will be restricted to one bag per person (the airline charges ~\$100.00 for a second bag). Any medical problem should be pointed out to faculty prior to leaving Toronto. If you require prescription drugs, be sure they are kept in the original prescription bottle, or are accompanied by the prescription. Students must obtain out-of-country medical coverage (Blue Cross or equivalent supplemental medical coverage) for the period of the field trip (unless you already covered by a plan for foreign medical expenses) prior to departure. They **must** also register with International SO, a partner of Ryerson International; visit <u>http://www.ryerson.ca/ri/global-learning/risk-management-steps/</u>.

Course Objectives: By the end of the course, students should expect to have an understanding of how geographic field work is conducted. In addition, the collection of field data and their role in decision-making and the generation of knowledge will be focal points of the course.

Required Texts: There is no required textbook for this course.

Posting of Grades: Grades will not be posted.

Course Evaluation: While in Italy and Austria, students are required to make observations, reflections and conclusions during scheduled activities and maintain an in-field observation journal. Independent

observations must be made throughout the field trip and will be a valuable source of additional information. Together, these can encompass your notes, sketches and other illustrations, summaries, data, collected information, proposals, insights and comparisons. (You should not offer a collection of filler material - brochures and other handouts - collected during the trip; nor provide a transcription of the notes and discussions).

You will be assigned to a group (here will be five groups with each one assigned a particular topic related to the field trip). In total, your group should put together a body of work expressing your insights and understanding of the topic that is assigned. Good presentations will be comprehensive, concise, thoughtful, insightful and perceptive. You will be given directions each day (while in the field) to assist you in organizing your observations and tips on presentation content.

IMPORTANT DATES: The class will meet three times during the fall semester in addition to nine days in the field.

The classes prior to departure – dates September 6 and 13, mandatory attendance (a 20% total course grade reduction will be administered for non-attendance).

The scheduled class on October 25: mandatory attendance (a 20% total course grade reduction will be administered for non-attendance in addition to a grade of zero for the group assignment presentations will occur during this class). The In-field observation journal must also be handed-in at the beginning of class; all work on this must be done individually. Late penalty: 50% per day (not accepted if more than one (1) school day late unless a medical certificate is submitted or other acceptable arrangements have been made and confirmed in writing prior to the due date.

Course Policies

All assignments must be <u>handed directly</u> to your instructor. Use of the essay/assignment drop box on the 6th floor of Jorgenson Hall will result in an automatic grade of 0 for the assignment.

Your instructor will endeavour to return the journal assignments within <u>two weeks</u> of their due date. NOTE: Unless otherwise indicated, all work must be done <u>individually</u>. Late penalty on all required course material: <u>50% per day</u> (not accepted if more than one (1) school day late unless a medical certificate is submitted or other acceptable arrangements have been made and confirmed in writing <u>prior to the due date</u>).

In order to receive a passing grade for the course, students must:

- 1) Meet acceptable standards in the required assignments;
- 2) Participate in the scheduled activities on the field trip itinerary (a 20% total course grade reduction will be administered for each scheduled event on the field trip where students fail to participate; a 10% total course grade reduction will be administered for each scheduled event on the field trip where students are late; a 10% total course grade reduction will be administered for each instance where students are late for transportation departure times); and
- 3) Meet professional standards of conduct. Students must adhere to the Student Code of Academic and Non-academic Conduct and other relevant university policies. You are responsible for reading the code. Proper student conduct is crucial on a trip of this nature any breach will be addressed by instituting disciplinary action.

Course Variations

Students are **required** to sign:

- a Release of Liability, Waiver of Claims, Assumption of Risks and Indemnity Agreement from the Department of Geography and Environmental Studies, Ryerson University (you will be provided with a copy of this form on September 6), and

Department Late Policy

Missed Classes and/or Evaluations

All academic work must be submitted using the citation style approved by the instructor.

It is assumed that all examinations and work submitted for evaluation and course credit will be the product of individual effort, except in the case of group projects arranged for and approved by the course instructor. Submitting the same work to more than one course, without instructor approval, is also considered a form of plagiarism.

Students are advised that suspicions of academic misconduct may be referred to the Academic Integrity Office (AIO). Students who are charged with academic misconduct will have a Disciplinary Notation (DN) placed on their academic record (not on their transcript) and will be assigned one or more of the following penalties:

- A grade reduction for the plagiarized work
- A zero for the plagiarized work
- An F in the course
- More serious penalties up to and including expulsion from the University
